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


# URBAN RESILIENCE








#### Oakland's Legacy of Redlining

Community-Led Transformation

- The Transformational Climate Communities (TCC) program provides funding for communityled transformation in California's most disadvantaged cities.
- The East Oakland Neighborhood Initiative (EONI), a partnership between the City of Oakland and thirteen (13) community organizations, received a TCC Planning Grant.
- The next phase is a \$28.2M implementation grant to implement community-led projects that achieve major environmental, health, and economic benefits in California's most disadvantaged communities.



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
