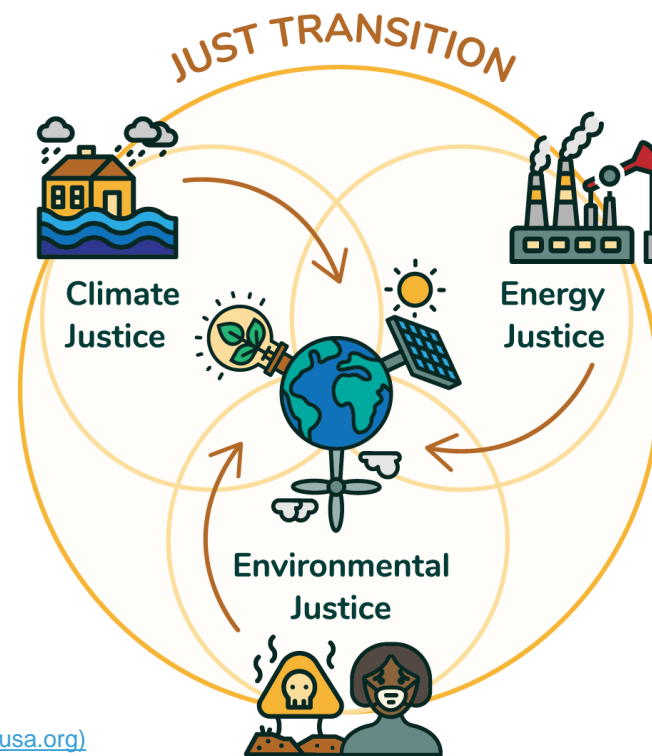
What is Energy Justice?

Seeks **equity** in the **social** and **economic** participation in the energy system

While **remediating** social, economic, and health **burdens** on “frontline communities” explicitly centering their concerns

Aims to make energy more **accessible**, **affordable**, **clean**, and **democratically** managed for all communities.




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Why is the concept of Energy Justice so important?

The outputs of our energy system disproportionately impact certain communities....

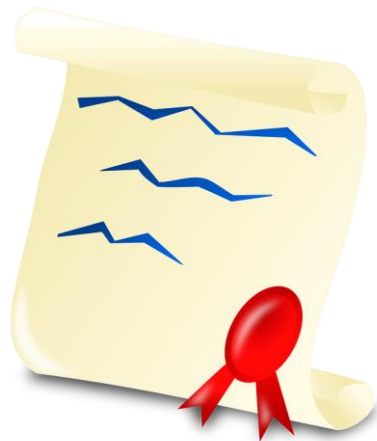




How do we embark on the clean energy transition without exacerbating inequality?



Federal Approach: The Justice40 Initiative



E.O. 14008, Section 223, January 27, 2021

“...the Director of the Office of Management and Budget, and the National Climate Advisor, in consultation with the Advisory Council, shall jointly publish recommendations on how certain Federal investments might be made toward a goal that 40 percent of the overall benefits flow to disadvantaged communities.”

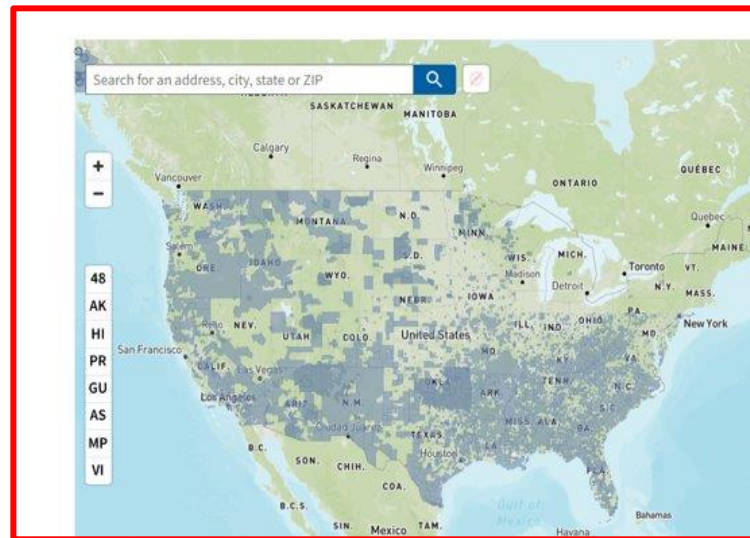

DOE Policy Priorities - Benefits

1. Decrease in energy burden
2. Decrease in environmental exposure and burdens
3. Increases in jobs/training
4. Increases in enterprise creation
5. Increases in energy democracy
6. Increases in low-cost capital
7. Increases in clean energy access and adoption
8. Increases in energy resilience

Important Federal Funding Available Now:

Formula Grant Programs

Non-competitive awards for state & local governments based on a congressionally directed formula

Competitive Grant Programs

Awarded to parties that apply to funding opportunities based on the merit of submitted proposals and other criteria

Lots of new investments that will revolutionize the energy sector:

The Backbone: Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (Nov. 2021) - \$1.2 trillion over 10 years (\$62 billion to DOE); largest long-term investment in our nation's infrastructure

The Brain: CHIPS and Science Act (Jul. 2022) invests in cutting-edge science and innovation to boost American competitiveness, including for semiconductors, and to bring jobs and supply chains home.

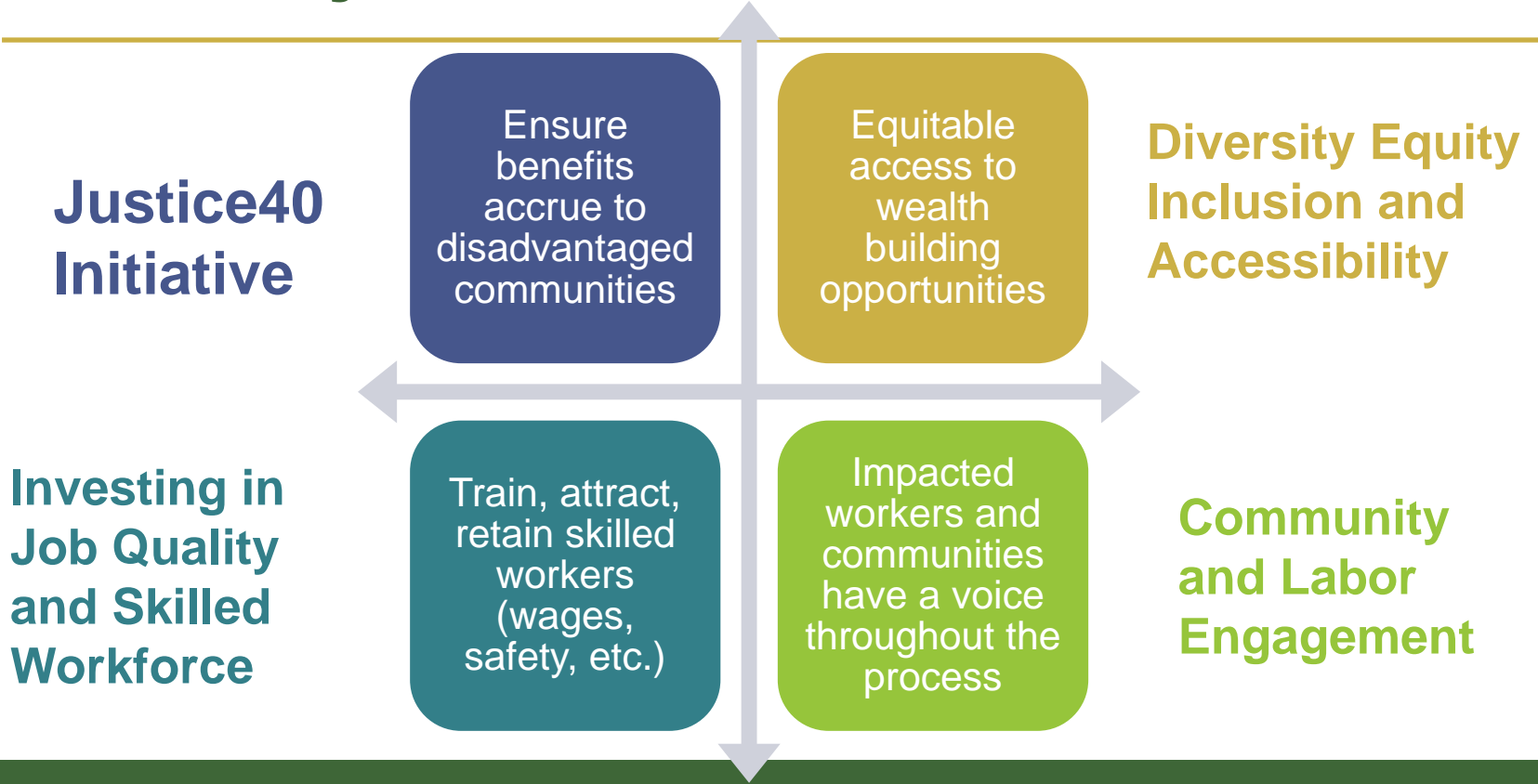
The Lungs: Inflation Reduction Act or IRA (Aug. 2022) breathes life into our clean energy economy by incentivizing deployment of clean technologies and lowering energy costs for American families.

To try to ensure that the benefits of investments are reaching disadvantaged communities, many government funding opportunities will require a COMMUNITY BENEFITS PLAN

Community Benefit Plan: 4 Priorities



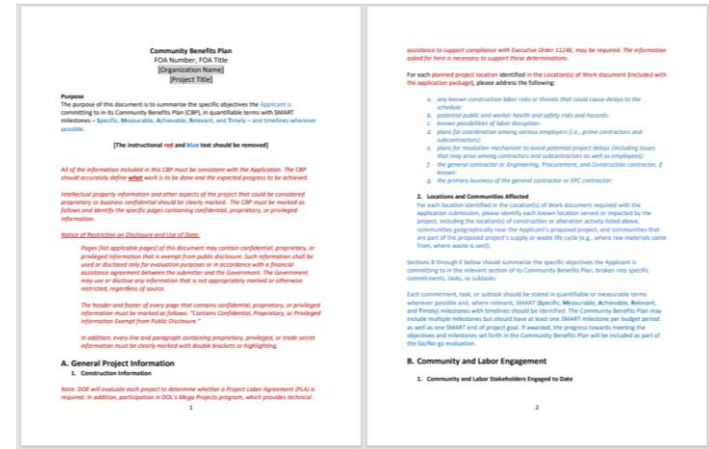
Community Benefits Plan Template

Each Funding Opportunity Announcement applicant is encouraged to use the CBP template to aid in the submission of the CBP portion of the application.

The CBP Template provides instructions on the type of information that an applicant should include so that they can submit a Community Benefits Plan that addresses all four priorities identified in the Community Benefits Plan portion of the Funding Opportunity Announcement.

R&D Community Benefits Plan: Three Priorities

1. Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Accessibility

- Equitable access to wealth building opportunities (teaming, access to good jobs, business and contracting opportunities, etc.)

2. Energy Equity

- How research will drive benefits to frontline communities and historically underrepresented groups (Disadvantaged Communities", or "DACs")

3. Workforce

- Consideration of long-term workforce impacts and opportunities of research.
 - Create/retain high-quality jobs
 - Attract, train, and retain skilled workers



As you consider your own grants or programs

- Leverage CEJST/Calenviroscreen to avoid reinventing the wheel
Benefit: A standardized geographic definition across programs and agencies can help concentrate fund sin the most needed areas
- Leverage the age of data
Benefit: Identify things that are quantifiable, measurable and trackable and request your own awardees to provide this. Don't focus merely on \$/investments, but *benefits*.
- Engage the community. Gain granularity in understanding the “where” and “who” benefits of your program, articulate this and evaluate impact for evidence-based decision making.
Benefit: Strengthens the case for funds and enables telling a fuller story on your programs

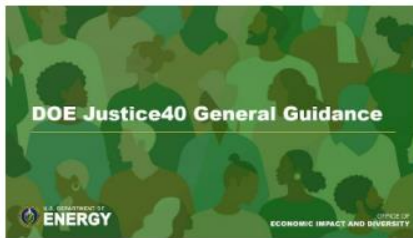

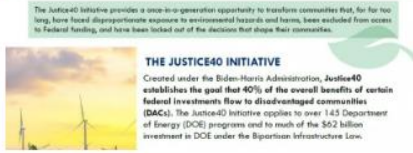

Low-income communities of color disproportionately bear the environmental harm and economic burdens of the energy system and do not equitably receive its benefits or have equitable access to decision-making processes. The clean energy transition presents an opportunity to transform communities. Justice40 is the tool to get there.

THE JUSTICE40 INITIATIVE

Created under the Biden-Harris Administration, Justice40 establishes the goal that 40% of the overall benefits of certain federal investments flow to disadvantaged communities (DACs).
